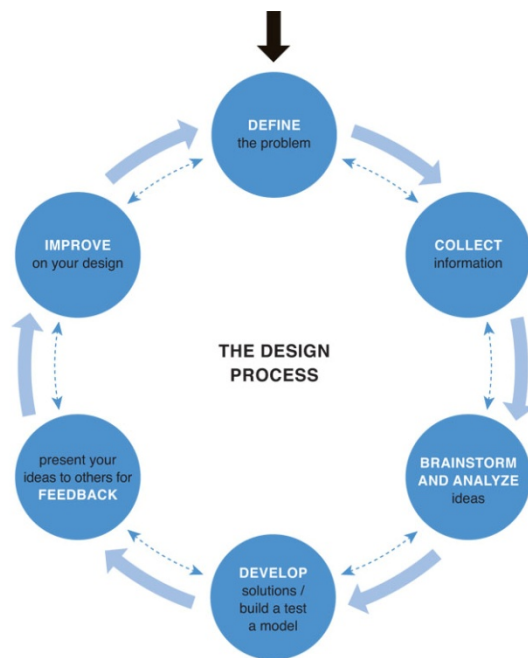

To protect the privacy of individuals, the National Archives does not release this specific information until 72 years after it was collected: the 1930 census was released to the public in 2002. Ancestry.com is easier to use, but requires subscription. In Chicago, Heritagequest.com is available free with a Chicago Public library card through remote online access.
